#### **REGULAR GIG HARBOR CITY COUNCIL MEETING OF JULY 12, 1999**

<u>PRESENT:</u> Councilmembers Young, Platt, Owel, Dick, Picinich, and Mayor Wilbert. Councilmembers Ekberg and Markovich were absent.

CALL TO ORDER: 7:01 p.m.

Mayor Wilbert announced that there was a correction to number three in the consent agenda, to read: Approval of Payment of Bills for July 12, 1999: Checks #22884 through #22972, in the amount of \$124,334.53.

**MOTION:** Move to approve the consent agenda with corrections to number 3 as

stated.

Picinich/Owel - unanimously approved.

#### **OLD BUSINESS:**

1. Second Reading of Ordinance - Prohibition of Commercial Card Games. Mark Hoppen introduced the second reading of this ordinance and explained that legal counsel had comments on changes to some language of the ordinance. He added that at the request of Councilmember Owel, he had downloaded the National Gambling Impact Study Commission report and said that one of the recommendations from the Commission was that States should not authorize any further convenience gambling operations and should cease and roll back existing operations. He said that this was a phenomenal

recommendation considering that the commission was represented by equal members of the gambling industry, as well as those folks with a polarize view of the industry. He read a comment that was made by Las Vegas Mayor, Jan Jones, regarding neighborhood gambling locations that may leave higher rates of adolescent gambling and problem, pathological gambling in later life.

Carol Morris, legal counsel, read the proposed changes to the language in section one to reflect that a new chapter was being added to the code rather than an existing one being amended. In section two she recommended adding language to clarify when the moratorium will be repealed adding the words "as of the effective date of this ordinance." The third suggested change is in Section one, subparagraph 1, to add the words "as defined in RCW 9.46.0217 and 9.46.0282" to clarify the definition of commercial stimulant.

Councilmember Young asked if the definition of commercial stimulant would include pull-tabs and punchboards, and wanted clarification on what the existing definitions included. Mark Hoppen said he was unsure of the language that was defined in the RCW chapters that were being amended in the ordinance, but that the intent of the ordinance was not to ban pull-tabs and punchboards. Carol Morris read the RCW definition of "social card games."

Mark Hoppen explained that there had been a one-sided population of interest in respect to social card games. He added that if the ordinance included punchboards and pull-tabs, there would have been other interests come forward as they are significant income producers. Councilmember Young said that he didn't know if you could make the social argument that you are getting rid of gambling if you allow certain forms to remain. He added that if gambling was to be banned, then all types should be banned. Councilmember Owel said that the ordinance was just about card games, then asked to hear from the public.

<u>Bruce Gair - 9301 North Harborview Drive.</u> Mr. Gair read an article from the Seattle PI regarding the harm that comes from gambling. He added that citizens could not depend on the legislature and urged Councilmembers to approve the ordinance.

Wes Sullivan - Pastor of the Church of the Nazarene. Pastor Sullivan read a statement regarding his opposition to gambling and spoke of its negative effects.

<u>Hank Searles - 4435 Holly Lane NW.</u> Mr. Searles said he would like to second Pastor Sullivan's comments.

Councilmember Picinich said that he was opposed to the city taking any revenue from gambling and that there are other ways to obtain revenues. He made the following motion.

MOTION: Move to adopt Ordinance No. 821 with the language changes as

recommended by Legal Counsel.

Picinich/Owel -

Councilmember Owel commented on Pastor Sullivan's statement that gambling is an economic mirage. She said that many states now have been able to issue economic studies that show that there is not a significant gain from gambling when you take into account the expense incurred from regulating the industry, law enforcement, and other costs. She added that Gig Harbor has economic vitality and that there is no need to entice this type of revenue into our community. She added that she supported the ordinance banning social card games as read.

Councilmember Young talked about the revenues from the taxing of the existing punchboards and pulltabs within town. He said that if these revenues are not needed in the city, and that if gambling should be banned as a moral issue, it should be taken to the next level and all forms of gambling, such as pull-tabs and punchboards, should be banned. He added that at least, if they are not banned, the tax on them should be eliminated altogether.

Mayor Wilbert said that this ordinance only addressed card games, and the other games could be addressed at a later date. Councilmember Picinich asked how much revenue the city receives from gambling taxes. Dave Rodenbach, Finance Director, said that it was somewhere in the neighborhood of eighty to ninety thousand dollars per year. Councilmember Young said that it is also a significant source of revenue for the businesses that have them.

RESTATED MOTION: Move to adopt Ordinance No. 821 with the language changes as

recommended by Legal Counsel.

Picinich/Owel - unanimously approved.

#### **NEW BUSINESS:**

1. <u>Purchase/Credit Card Resolution</u>. Dave Rodenbach said that this is a resolution to formalize how the city currently handles credit card use. He said that the state requires that Council adopt formal procedures.

MOTION: Move to adopt Resolution No. 536 as presented.

Young/Platt - unanimously approved.

#### **PUBLIC COMMENT/DISCUSSION:**

<u>Pam Darland - Weatherswood Neighborhood.</u> Ms. Darland voiced her concerns about the potential danger of the proposed gas line across the Narrows and up into county parkland and through their neighborhood. She said that the neighbors are scared of what could happen with this line and felt they never had the opportunity to oppose its location. Mark Hoppen explained that during the comment period on the E.I.S. he had vigorously protested the selected location of the line because there were other alternatives, although more expensive, that would have avoided the more populated areas and would not have put a pipeline through the middle of a park. He

added that there had never been any other opportunity for the City of Gig Harbor to comment on this project, and she was advised to attend County Council meetings and voice her concerns.

#### **COUNCIL COMMENTS:**

Councilmember Owel asked about scheduling a Council Retreat. The last week in August was decided upon and she offered to schedule Murphy's Landing for the retreat.

Councilmember Picinich said that the Maritime Gig had another successful year, and added that after participating for three years, he was looking for a replacement as Co-chair for the festival. Councilmember Young said he would consider the position.

#### **STAFF REPORTS:**

Mark Hoppen announced that on August 9<sup>th</sup>, Rhonda Brooks from DOT would like to make a presentation on the status of the Highway 16/Narrows Bridge Project. He asked when Council would like to hear this presentation and suggested at 6:00 before the regular Council meeting time. That time was agreed upon.

Mayor Wilbert reported on the success of the ribbon cutting ceremony for the Finholm View Climb.

I received the City of Gig Harbor Resolution No. 533 relating to "potential tolls to finance construction of new roads and bridges, and to refinance preservation and maintenance of existing public highways and bridges, originally constructed using toll revenues". While I appreciate the spirit of the council's resolution, it does not recognize some of the difficult realities facing transportation funding in our state.

With regard to the Council's position that tolls should not be used for the financing, preservation and maintenance of existing transportation facilities, I am forwarding a recent State Transportation Commission resolution, indicating support for a continuation of state maintenance funds for the existing Tacoma Narrows Bridge, even after the new one is built. However, it will be a legislative decision as to whether those funds are available on a continual basis during the life of the tolled project.

I understand that many Gig Harbor citizens voted against the proposed Tacoma Narrows Bridge project in last November's advisory election. We have listened to peoples' concerns and have addressed many of the issues in the agreement with United Infrastructure Washington that was signed on June 15, 1999. I am enclosing information regarding the agreement that I hope you and the Council will find useful.

It is my hope that as we move forward, we can work together with you and the City Council to develop these improvements in the most efficient manner and at the lowest cost. I would appreciate an opportunity to provide a briefing to you and the Council at

WHEREAS, Pierce County qualifies as an urban county under the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, as amended; and

WHEREAS, The U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development requires re-qualification of urban counties every three years; and

#### DISTRIBUTION:

WHEREAS, As part of that urban county, Pierce County receives federal Community Development Block Grant, Emergency Shelter Grant, and Home Investment Partnership funds; and

WHEREAS, Pierce County acts as an administrator of those programs for the cities, towns, and the unincorporated areas of Pierce County (except the City of Tacoma and the City of Lakewood); and

WHEREAS, The U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development requires cooperation agreements between the cities and towns (except the City of Tacoma and the City of Lakewood) as part of the qualification process; NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of Pierce County:

Section 1. The Council hereby authorizes the County Executive to enter into cooperative agreements with the 19 cities and towns of Pierce County (Bonney Lake, Buckley, Carbonado, DuPont, Eatonville, Edgewood, Fife, Fircrest, Gig Harbor, Milton, Orting, Puyallup, Roy, Ruston, South Prairie, Steilacoom, Sumner, University Place, and Wilkeson) to re-qualify as an urban county consortium, to receive federal community development block grant, emergency shelter grant, and home investment partnership funds.

<u>Section 2.</u> The Clerk of the Council shall provide a copy of this Resolution to the County Executive, the Executive Director of Community & Human Services, and the Director of the Department of Community Services.

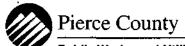

Dear Lead Implementer:

Your organization has been identified as a lead implementer in the attached **KEY PENINSULA/GIG HARBOR/ISLANDS (KGI) WATERSHED ACTION PLAN**. The purpose of the Plan is to protect beneficial uses of water such as drinking water, shellfish, fish, wildlife, and recreation by improving water quality. We are already beginning to see the effects of water quality problems in the watershed with shellfish bed closures and swimming beach closures. It is our hope that you will play a role in helping correct these problems and work with us help to keep the water in the KGI area clean.

The Plan was developed cooperatively by citizens and agencies to address water pollution problems related to agriculture, boats and marinas, forestry, septic systems, stormwater, construction, household activities, shorelines, water conservation, enforcement, habitat, and education. The Plan is not regulatory.

As a lead implementer, we ask that you review the recommendations or "Action Items" that have been assigned to you, and determine your ability to carry them out. For your convenience, Appendices "B", "C" and "D" summarize all "Action Items" so that you can easily review items which identify you as a lead implementer and/or funding source.

If you have any questions or comments, would like a better understanding of the process, or are concerned about the commitment you are being asked to make, please contact *Barbara Ann Smolko at (253) 798-6156*, or *Roy Huberd at (253) 798-6793*. If we have made a mistake and you are not the right organization to implement the "Action Item", please let us know. We plan to phone you and also meet with you in the near future regarding your participation.

Once you have determined that you are able to implement the recommendations, please send the KGI Watershed Committee a "Letter of Concurrence" or "Resolution" (by September 30, 1999), which verifies the action items you will be addressing and when you expect to begin work on them. A sample "Letter of Concurrence" is attached. The KGI Watershed Committee will do its best to support you in your efforts, so please feel free to call on us for assistance.

A Public Meeting on the KGI WATERSHED ACTION PLAN will be held on Wednesday, August 11, 1999 at 6:30pm at Rosedale Community Hall, (253) 851-3187 (2nd Gig Harbor exit, next to the high school). Please join us to meet the Watershed Committee, learn more about the process used to create the Plan, and to discuss your role in helping to keep our water clean. Thank you!

WHEREAS, pursuant to RCW 35.21.100, the City of Gig Harbor may accept any donations of money by ordinance, and may carry out the terms of the donation, if the same are within the powers granted to the City by law; and

WHEREAS, the City has received a check in the amount of Seven Hundred Seventy
Three Dollars and Forty-five Cents (\$773.45) from Northwest Snowboards, Inc., to be used for the
purpose of assisting with the construction costs of a skateboard park; now, therefore,

Section 2. Finance Director to Receipt Funds. The Finance Director shall deposit the donation in the City's General Fund, and shall earmark the funds to be used for the purposes described in this ordinance.

Section 4. Effective Date. This ordinance shall take effect and be in full force five (5) days after publication of an approved summary consisting of the title.

The quarterly financial reports for the second quarter of 1999 are attached.

Total resources, including all revenues and beginning cash balances, are at 62% of the annual budget. Revenues, excluding cash balances, are at 37% of the annual budget. Expenditures (including ending fund balances) are at 19%.

General Fund revenues (excluding beginning cash balance) are at 54% of budget. Tax receipts are slightly ahead of pace at 54%, with sales and property taxes being at 53 and 54% respectively. Licenses and permits and charges for services are at 60 and 100% of their respective budgets. The court is on pace to slightly exceed budget, with revenues at 58% of budget through June.

General Fund expenditures are at 42% of budget. Legal fees are at 37% of budget through June. All departments have expended less than 50% of their 1999 appropriations.

Street revenues are at 9% and expenditures 10% of budget. This is because most of the Street Fund budgeted revenues are grants and inter-fund transfers. These revenues will not be received until related project expenditures are incurred. Operations and maintenance expenditures for the Street Fund are at 68% of budget.

Water and Sewer revenues are 38 and 46% of budget. Water expenditures are 21% of budget while Sewer expenditures are 42%. Through June 1999, expenditures for Water and Sewer are at 35 and 36% of budget.

Cash balances are adequate in all funds. The major portion (86%) of the City's investments are in the State Treasurer's pool and earned a return of 4.9%. The City also has 11% of the City's available funds invested outside the pool at rates ranging from 5.8 through 6.3%.

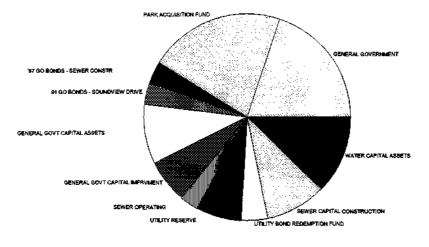

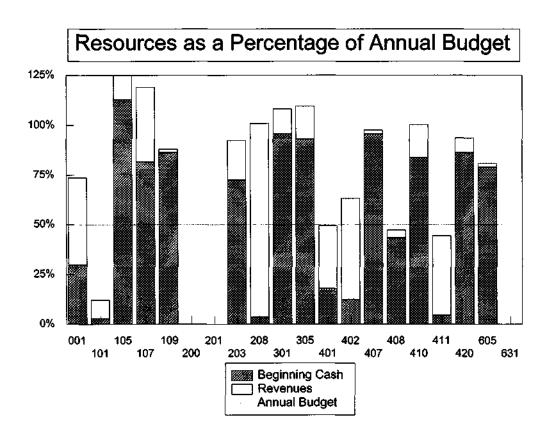
# Ending Cash Balances By Fund

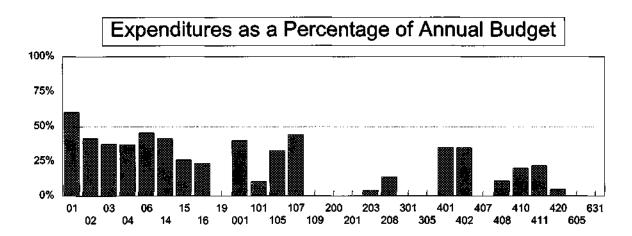

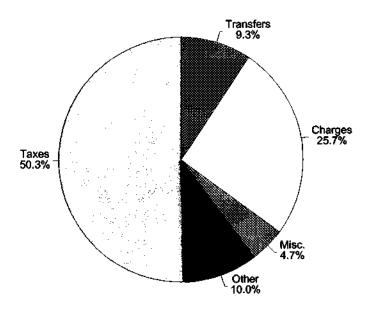

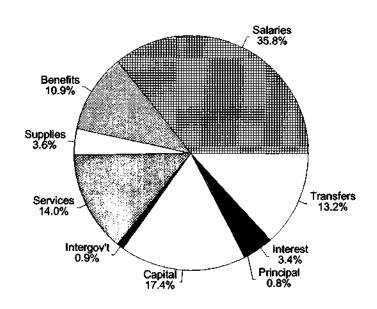
## Revenues by Type - All Funds

The June 1999 activity statistics are attached for your review.

The Reserves provided 398.5 hours of service in June. This was divided between 358.5 hours of patrol time, 28 administrative/training hours, and 12 hours of MSU.

The Marine Services Unit answered 4 dispatched calls and provided 4 written inspections in June. They accounted for 61 hours of patrol time, 6.25 hours of maintenance and ½ hour of administrative time. Officer Galligan displayed the boat and equipment at "Criminal Justice Day" at Green River College, and the boat was present on the bay for the annual Blessing of the Fleet.

The Explorers volunteered 154 hours of service in June. This was split between regular meetings and assisting at the Maritime Gig festival, Relay for Life event, and a bicycle safety day in conjunction with the fire department.

The bike patrol was out for 20 hours in June. Most of this was during the Maritime Gig festival. During the event the officers assisted with traffic control for the road closures, made a number of citizen contacts and reunited two lost children with their parents.
